Based on her very detailed ethnography and unique longitudinal village study (covering 70 years) in the Yangtze Valley village where Professor Fei Xiaotong gestated peasant life in China (1939), this paper will present a Chinese model of reciprocity, relatedness, and networks; and illustrate the dynamics of change between different types of relationships in China.

Dr Xiangqun Chang is a research fellow in the Asia Research Centre, LSE and a visiting professor in the Centre for Social and Cultural Anthropology, Fudan University and at the School of Humanities and Law, Northeast University, China.
